


Tears and Symphony





Chair Based Exercise in the P3A

In late Summer 2023 we had a bright idea! Would a chair based exercise class, for those less mobile, work in the P3A? We decided it probably would, and set about chatting to the professional trainers at our gym. They agreed it was a very good idea, in fact they were enthusiastic and encouraged us to give it a go.

So, in late September we launched Circl Mobility Gold with professional instructor Tatiana. Within hours of the launch notice being released, all fifteen available chairs were taken and a waiting list created. The initial class took place at the Coral Star in Peyia with fifteen very keen, if a little unsure, participants.

The class involves exercises for all the major muscle groups in the body, but based very strictly on the chair. The first couple of classes were a gentle introduction, but very soon the intensity was ramped up. By Christmas all participants were excelling at resistance band work, bicep curls and the dreaded stand-up challenge! Due to popular demand, a second Circl Mobility Class was launched, with all the fifteen available chairs being snapped up.

In January, we launched Chair Yoga, with professional and very experienced yoga teacher Anastasia. Once again, the available chairs were filled very quickly. Anastasia takes class members through yoga moves designed to support, strengthen and improve flexibility. A very different class from the Circl class, but found to be very enjoyable and rewarding by everyone who regularly attends.

April The History of Nicosia Airport by Malcolm Brooke



The story unfolds from the rough, red earth of the 1920s and the years of expansion and promise; then to the dramatic events of 1974 when the airport became a United Nations Protected Area.

Nicosia airport is an abandoned airport in Cyprus and has been frozen in time for half a century. It's filled with rusting airplanes and peeling paint. Nicosia International Airport was abandoned in 1974 due to conflict in Cyprus. It was once the Mediterranean island's main airport, but it's been untouched for almost 50 years.

Within the buffer zone on the western edge of Nicosia, the hangars and runways of the Nicosia International Airport remain much as they were on 16 August 1974 – frozen in time.

The airport began service as Royal Air Force Station, Nicosia, and saw heavy use during the Second World War. It opened as a commercial airport two years after the end of the War, in 1947, but the area surrounding the airport itself remained the location for the Air Station.

Malcolm has been fortunate in being able to explore the UNPA on a number of occasions and, coupled with his extensive research, is more than able to describe the airport's troubled history.

Wind, Waves and the Story of Akrotiri, Cyprus by Heather and Roger Kent

Did you know that Akrotiri was once an island? Akrotiri did not even exist 10,000 years ago (a very short period geologically speaking) and has only physically been as we see it today from the 1700s.

Heather & Roger Kent's presentation will consider the effects of the action of wind and waves on a coastline and relate this to a local Cyprus feature which we will all know as the Akrotiri Peninsula.

What we may not know is that Akrotiri is actually a very diverse area (ie not just the RAF airstrip), with the Salt Lake, tourist beaches, marshes and sand dunes. It boasts the most important water aquifer in Cyprus, has over 300 bird species recorded, has archaeology going back to Hellenic times with stone age inhabitants and even pygmy hippopotamuses.

Heather and Roger will describe events that has transformed the area in the last 10,000 years right up to the present, when the City Of Dreams Casino has just been opened.

As usual, Man has involved himself and upset the natural pattern of development.

Astrobiology: The Search for Life Beyond Earth by David Raffe

Astrobiology deals with some of the deepest questions that have fascinated humankind for millennia:

Where did we come from?

Are we alone? (Is there anybody out there)?

Where are we going?

The unofficial definition of astrobiology is "the study of life in the universe". While this is often interpreted as life beyond Earth, it actually includes our planet too.

Astrobiologists use Earth—which is the only planet known to have life—as an example for trying to find life on other worlds. They examine the myriad of processes that take place for life to both exist, survive, and thrive on our small, blue world. They ask whether these same processes could be responsible for life existing on other worlds, not just in our solar system, but throughout the universe.

Whilst present technological constraints currently limit our direct search for life beyond Earth to our solar system, there are several planetary bodies that are targets for astrobiologists. These include Mars along with several of Jupiter's icy moons as well as Saturn's largest moon.

The first part of this talk will focus on defining exactly what life is, and how it emerged here on Earth. We'll look at how it got started on our geologically new planet with chemistry transitioning to biology. This will also consider alternative chemistries for life that don't include water or carbon.

The second part will look at the tools and techniques that are being used to detect life beyond Earth and some likely candidates where astrobiologists believe conditions may be suitable to support the emergence of life.
